
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BLACKHAWKS ON CAMPUS

February 24, 2023, a On thrilling sight greeted the students and faculty of the University of Maryland: three Blackhawk helicopters landing on Chapel Fields. The Black Hawks, belonging to the 12th Aviation Battalion based out of Fort Belvoir, VA, transported Terrapin Battalion Cadets to their Land Navigation FTX at Quantico Marine Corps Base where they practiced their map reading and orienteering skills. The program thanks the 12th Aviation Battalion for their support and cooperation in making this unique opportunity possible.





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From February 23 to 25, **Terrapin Battalion Cadets faced** a challenging Land Navigation FTX at Quantico Marine Corps Base. The Cadets had to navigate through complex terrain using maps, compasses and protractors. They had to find various points in both daylight and night conditions while avoiding obstacles and hazards. The FTX was designed test the Cadets' land to navigation skills and prepare them for the land navigation course at Cadet Summer Training (CST) at Fort Knox this summer. This particular course difficult land is the most navigation course Terrapin Battalion Cadets face prior to CST. Cadets also got hands-on practice with M4A1s, M249s, M240Bs, and SINGCARS Radios.

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ENGAGEMENT SKILLS TRAINER



EST is a virtual simulation system that provides realistic and safe training on various weapons and scenarios. The Cadets learned how to handle, aim and fire the M4 carbine. The EST training was part of the Cadets' preparation for the Weapons Qualification course at Cadet Summer Training (CST) this summer. The Cadets improved their confidence, accuracy and proficiency with the weapons and gained valuable experience to bring with them to CST this summer.

The Lt. Richard W. Collins III Scholarship was awarded to Cadet Skyeler Antonino. He was selected for this honor due to his strong commitment to service, exemplary leadership skills, and his high level of achievement as the previous ROTC Cadet Army **Operations Sergeant Major** of and a student the University of Maryland.

The scholarship promotes the values and strong character that Lt. Collins demonstrated throughout his life. His legacy serves as an inspiration to not only our ROTC scholarship recipients, but to all everyone at the University of Maryland. Lt. Richard W. Collins III, 23, was an ROTC candidate at Bowie State University, set to graduate and begin his commission in the Army as a 2nd Lieutenant, when he was killed on the University of Maryland campus. The tragedy of his death on May 20, 2017—just days before he would have graduated from BSU with a degree in business

administration-was felt by entire Maryland the community. The university honors and celebrates Lt. Collins's life and legacy through this scholarship and the creation of the Social Justice Alliance. in Bowie partnership with State University.

PROJECT GO AT GEORGE MASON UNIVERSITY

Students live on campus and participate in immersive Korean language courses, cultural activities, and local visits within the Northern Virginia and Washington, D.C. area. PROJECT GO AT COMMONWEALTH UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA

The 12 credit "dusk-to-dawn" hybrid language program provides Cadets with Russian language and culture training at the beainner and intermediate levels. Students begin this program in Bloomsburg, PA at the Commonwealth University of Pennsylvania for five weeks and, then, travel to Riga, Latvia for additional three weeks. The program includes a rigorous academic component, rich cultural immersion, and language skills assessment upon program completion.

Cadet Zachary Doser will have an opportunity to not only take general Russian language classes, but also take a week-long specialized course in either Russian for Military, Russian for Business, or Russian for Politics modules.

Cadet Doser applied for the hybrid program because he wanted to learn Russian in an immersive program where he would be forced to learn the language in a russian-speaking country. He believes that it is important know the to languages of near peer adversaries—a leading factor in his decision to attend.

Cadet Doser is majoring in Government and Politics: International Relations. Within ROTC, he participates in Drill Team and Color Guard. Outside of ROTC, he's involved with the soccer support club, The Crew.
